From the Director—

The BRICK is about to celebrate its 10 year anniversary and it sure is something to shout about!!

Watching our operations on a daily basis, it's hard to picture just how far we've come; but there are lots of ways to see that The BRICK has grown in effectiveness and maturity over the past decade.

- From half a dozen churches, our member congregations are now 19 strong!
- Initially serving 115 households in 2008 (earliest records), the Benevolence Program is now serving about 1,000 people from 400 households annually!
- Our Food Shelf Program served 1,117 households in 2012 (earliest data), and grew to serving 3,202 households in 2016!
- From one Food Shelf Outlet to four pantry locations!

Of course, all that growth is reflected in The BRICK's income and spending. The 2009 budget totaled \$213,700. Compare that to the 2017 budget at \$675,190 – WOW, we sure have grown!

And yet, numbers can only measure quantity. They don't reflect quality.

The quality we value is made clear in our mission "to live Christ's message to **compassionately love** and respect those in need." Our staff and volunteers have always been dedicated to these core principles and we've always been committed to how we deliver services. As The BRICK has matured, our leaders have become more informed about what that means.

- Best practices include meeting all partner agency requirements, such as annual Civil Rights
 Training.
- We have meaningful job descriptions that make clear our performance expectations for every level of involvement, from our board and staff roles, to our volunteer opportunities.
- We have Employee, Volunteer and Outlet Site Manager Handbooks, that provide guidance and ensure continuity of processes and procedures throughout our agency.
- We encourage personal and professional growth by allowing for board and staff members to attend workshops and conferences, and by providing in-services for all our volunteers.
- ♦ We have criteria for program participation, to ensure that all who qualify receive services.

Most importantly, we regularly evaluate our own activities. We share the joys of our successes. And when we occasionally stumble, we use what we've learned to do better the next time. This takes guts – and a measure of God's grace. We know that we "can do all this through him...." (Philippians 4:13, NIV) In fact, we cannot do any of this without God. The Spirit reassures us of God's presence and guides us to follow God's call.

As we look to the future, there are certainly opportunities for expansion just around the corner! Join us as we grow in Christ's love.

Greetings from the Cable Area Food Shelf volunteers! We are on our seventh year of operation as a food outlet of The BRICK and things are going very well in Cable. We sponsored our sixth annual Empty Bowl Event in April. Prior to that, in December of 2016 our covenant church, Cable Congregational United Church of Christ, sponsored our second annual Second Chapter Christmas Sale as a fundraiser for The BRICK. Both were very successful events, building community awareness of the needs in Ashland and Bayfield Counties and, through the community's generosity, raising funds to help us continue our operations serving those with the greatest need.

Our volunteers primarily come through the four Cable churches: Cable UCC, Trinity Lutheran Chapel, Living Hope Community Church and St. Ann Catholic Church. Each church has two coordinators to organize volunteers for the months they serve in the Food Shelf. Many thanks to all our dedicated volunteers!

We have given out more food per person in this past year than ever largely due to the efforts of our Food Manager, Jim McPhetridge. We are thankful for his support and assistance in obtaining food from Second Harvest Northern Lakes Food Bank and The Emergency Food Assistance Program as well as multiple organizations that generously donate food for our distribution.

We look forward to another year of serving our community and the surrounding area.

Meredith and Kevin never had financial problems. They were very happy, especially when Juliann was born. Kevin worked full-time, and Meredith worked part-time. Everything was going well -- until it wasn't. It started when Kevin hurt his shoulder helping his father-in-law move some farm equipment after work. The doctor told him he would need surgery and didn't know how long Kevin would have to be off work.

Not long after Kevin's shoulder surgery, Juliann got really sick. Meredith had to take off work to be with her little one in the hospital for a week. All these unexpected events caused the family to get behind on the bills.

After sitting down with the couple at The BRICK, we worked together to talk with vendors and develop realistic payment plans to get back control of their finances. The Benevolence Program was able to put some money down with one of the vendors that required a payment in order to set up a payment plan. We partnered with other organizations in the area to help with other vendors monetarily.

With Kevin released to go back to work full-time, it will take a little time, but the family has a good start to getting back where they want to be financially.

This is just one example of how The BRICK's Benevolence Program helps out every day. It takes a lot of listening, because we care about the individual. Our solutions aren't one-size-fits-all, because we respect our consumers' needs. It's much more than just cutting a check; we know that money alone won't solve all problems. It's about taking our vision to heart -- to provide services and build relationships to change people's circumstances and lives through Christ.

As I sit in my warm home, watching my cats play, dunking freshly baked cookies that my beautiful daughter just made in milk, I reflect at how truly fortunate I am.

Nearly four years ago, I found myself homeless, jobless, penniless and hopeless. With three kids to care for, I didn't know what I would do. I had nowhere to turn. Confused,

overwhelmed, and scared, I prayed a lot and God miraculously provided. He does that somehow - in ways we could never imagine. He puts people in our lives at just the right time to be a star in our dark night.

Sadly, many of our community members who call in begging for help are in the same boat, with no land in sight. But we at The BRICK Ministries are the shining light in the dense fog. They muster up the courage to make the call or walk through our doors hanging on to the slightest bit of dignity they have left after wracking their brains, trying to figure out how they are going to get out of the endless pit of debt and despair. I know they are really struggling and could use a smile, a loving touch, or a compassionate ear because my desk is in the front office. I see the tears; I sense the anger and frustration. My heart aches for them. Our volunteers feel the same way. They make a difference in program participants' lives at the very moment they meet, whether in person or on the phone. They are making an impact by treating participants with respect and deep concern. Their sacrifice of time and energy speaks volumes to the hurting people who feel so alone. I believe that is what ministry is. . . loving people despite the circumstances through Christ and His love for us - one heart to another, one life connecting to another, BRICK by BRICK.

As we make more of an impact here in Ashland and Bayfield Counties, our need for volunteers grows also. Please consider becoming a volunteer. You will be blessed beyond measure.

I often reflect on The BRICK's mission statement, "The BRICK lives Christ's message to compassionately love and respect those in need." and ponder how am I doing? Then I ask the same question when I study our vision statement, "To provide services and build relationships to change people's circumstances and lives through Christ." Serving as the president of The BRICK and volunteering at the food shelf helps me understand what those statements mean.

In Isaiah (58:4) we read, "For you have been a refuge to the poor, a refuge to the needy in their distress." Christ's message is the same: We are called to love and serve one another as Christ's representatives, to be that refuge for the poor.

I believe that our society has a responsibility to those who are less fortunate. Many times, people are found to be in circumstances that require assistance. That is our purpose - "To compassionately love and respect those in need."

One of the seven Catholic social teachings is the preferential option for the poor and vulnerable. It is described on the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops website as:

"A basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring. In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition recalls the story of the Last Judgment (Mt 25:31-46) and instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first."

I have a responsibility to see that the mission and vision is being realized. I am proud of our staff and all the volunteers that make this happen. I am proud of our growth since The BRICK's inception ten years ago. We have grown through some difficult times and, with the grace of God, we will continue to grow. We can do this because of the people that believe in our mission and vision. Our communities in Ashland, Mellen, Cable, and Cornucopia and surrounding areas have all graciously supported The BRICK Ministries. Area churches, community organizations and individuals continue to provide financial support, volunteer hours and in kind donations - for all of which we are extremely thankful.
