I told them about our landlord list and explained that we could give them a night at the motel to give them time to find a place to live.

It was exciting to see their demeanor change from discouragement to empowerment, as they made calls and asked around the community to find a place of their own. Over the next couple of days, they kept me informed of their search. Unfortunately, they were not finding any prospects, and we were concerned what the next steps might need to be.

I was in my office when I heard Ava and Noah come in. They were so excited, and naturally, the emotion was contagious. They told me how they had been out walking around town, looking for possible places to rent, when they ran into someone that was moving out of a rental. They talked with the person, who immediately introduced them to the landlord. The landlord was willing to work with them on getting into the place and even offered to help with some furniture! God is so good!

I have the joy of seeing God work in the lives of our neighbors every day. Although we can't provide long-term shelter, by working with our motel partners, we are able to offer people time to regroup and create a plan to find a place they can call home.

From the Board Room

The BRICK is blessed to have the support of this community. I am often humbled by the generosity of our covenant churches, volunteers, BRICK board members, and patrons. But the need continues.

We are in the middle of Lent. Pope Francis in his message for Lent says, “Lent summons us, and enables us, to come back to the Lord wholeheartedly and in every aspect of our life.”

I have found Lent to be a challenging time because we are asked to sacrifice, which can be difficult. It calls for us to look at our lives in depth, and remove those obstacles that keep us from knowing our Lord. Lent is a time of sacrifice - to pray, to give and to fast.

During my morning prayer on Ash Wednesday, I read from Isaiah, “This is the fast that pleases me, says the Lord: share your bread with the hungry, and shelter the homeless poor. . . . Then you will cry and the Lord will hear; you will call, and he will say, ‘I am here.’” (Is 58: 6-7,9, New American Bible).

That reading is a call to witness - to share our gifts with those in need. The BRICK offers us a concrete opportunity to meet our Lenten obligations. We ask for your prayers; we ask for your gifts; we ask you to share your bread with the hungry. The call of the hungry is clear and present. Will we say, “I am here.”?
