Their generosity, as well as all the gardeners, farmers, food drive coordinators, and food collectors, goes a long way to putting food on tables throughout the region!

We're also grateful for the **Bad River Housing Authority** (BRHA), who made a business seed donation to the Make A Difference Fund. Executive Director Robert Houle says, ". . . . we are proud to work with local organizations such as The BRICK who also have a similar goal and mission to meet the needs of our area's low-income residents." ## **Grant Award News!**

It's a happy day when The BRICK receives an email with "Grant Approved" in the subject line! Donations from individuals and local businesses, churches, and other organizations are the main source of cash flow for The BRICK; yet a diverse funding stream is essential for any health organization. That's why we actively seek out partnerships with grant makers who share our values and mission to serve our community. This quarter The BRICK has been fortunate to receive two grant awards.

The Otto Bremer Trust (OBT), a longtime supporter of The BRICK, has awarded \$50,000 for general operating expenses! Most grants are available only for special projects or programs, so that makes the OBT award doubly important. These funds can be used for

all the things needed to keep our essential programs running - like our electric bill and snow plow costs. Many thanks go to the team at Otto Bremer Trust for their confidence in our work to serve the low income residents in our area!

The Otto Bremer Trust, based in St. Paul, Minn., is a private charitable trust established in 1944 by founder Otto Bremer, a successful banker and community business leader. OBT owns 92 percent of Bremer Bank and also manages a diversified investment portfolio. The mission of OBT is to invest in people, places and opportunities in the Upper Midwest. Since its inception, OBT has invested more than \$600 million in organizations throughout Minnesota, North Dakota, and western Wisconsin. Visit ottobremer.org.

For the second year in a row Compeer Financial selected The BRICK's Food Shelf Program to receive grant funds through its Fund for Rural America. This year the award is four times larger than last year at \$10,000! These dollars will ensure that our pantry shoppers will have access to a variety of nutritious food and essential personal care items to complement unpredictable in-kind donations. Leonard came to me feeling defeated. No matter how much overtime he put in, he felt like he was always behind. His wife and three small children were all that

mattered to him, and he wanted to be able to provide for them. We decided together to set up a time to look at all his expenses. We created a spending plan, laying out all his bills. Based on when he would get paid, we decided what bills needed to be paid when and put the payment dates on the calendar. We called some of the vendors to request changing the dates to work better with his pay schedule. He also talked to the credit card company and negotiated a lower rate per month. The BRICK was able to put some funds toward his rent and utility bill.

Leonard was so happy to find that after all his hard work to get caught up, he finally felt like it was really happening. He could see the light at the end of the tunnel. This was the best shape financially he had been in since he was forced to change jobs two years ago due to his long-time employer deciding to close the business.

There are many families in our community that face real challenges, like Leonard and his family, keeping up with the basic bills required to live, working 40 plus hours a week. The BRICK works with families to create spending plans that are realistic and manageable. We work with vendors to negotiate payment plans that can be achieved. Most importantly, The BRICK staff and volunteers compassionately love and respect those in need and work to find real solutions to that overwhelmed feeling finances can bring.
