From the Director—

Fall is quickly approaching, and with it comes transition. We transition from long days full of sunlight to shorter days with an earlier sunset. We turn up the furnace at night. The end of summer is a good time to look back at all the bounty of the summer. We started off June with our annual meeting – an opportunity to share our Christ centered mission and vision with our member congregations. An abundance of food was donated to our pantry program. Staff got to attend a Bridges Out of Poverty workshop. This summer we were fortunate to have Northland College Student Andrew Hofer serving as our Intern. Our South Shore Food Shelf has moved into a different room in the Bell Community Center and now has a permanent home!

We also have fantastic partners who support our work with their own special events. Northwoods Community Credit Union hosted their annual Grill-Out for our Benevolence Program. The great folks at Pagac's Bar held a Bike Run for our Food Shelf Program. Once again Pat and Terri Miller and crew did a super job of coordinating the 10th Annual Jack O'Brien Memorial Charity Golf Tournament. The Chequamegon Food Co-op hosted an Ice Cream Social for The BRICK at their Summer Bash.

Autumn also means looking ahead. The most immediate transition is finding a new Food Shelf Manager. For nearly a year, Dan Cameron has served in that position, and has shared his technical expertise to help make our Food Shelf Program even better. We're grateful for all he's given and hope to find a candidate who is as dedicated and skilled as Dan. Please take the time to let Dan know how much you appreciate his contributions.

Every fall our finances team works to develop a budget for the next year. We look at the patterns of income and spending over the last several years, factor in any variations that we expect, and build our budget from there. We recognize that without a plan, there's no accountability. This applies to both expenses and fund development.



Our leadership team will also be taking a closer look at SuperShelf. This is a model for pantry programs that focuses on encouraging shoppers to make healthy choices, and empowering consumers to make selections that work best for their own households. We'll be exploring how we can implement SuperShelf ideals to make our Food Shelf Program a grocery store experience for our shoppers.

These highlights show how much there is to do at The BRICK, all while focusing on our work to "live Christ's message to compassionately love and respect those in need."

The South Shore Food Shelf completed the first phase of our move during July. The second phase will be complete when we get the badly needed new freezer and additional shelving, allowing us to serve our families better. This is thanks to cooperation from the Town of Bell, the community

of Cornucopia, and some of our great volunteers. Our local general store Ehlers generously provided commercial shelving. John Hall and Gordon Anderson gave many construction hours installing shelving and walls. Jane Hennesy and Joyce Adamson were there for the moving and organizing of all the food stock. The new space allows us to leave our inventory in



place, without having to pack and store after each opening. It also gives our shoppers a more grocery-store-like experience.



Grant Award News!



Over the years The BRICK has been blessed with multiple grants from the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP). The board of this nationwide program is made up of representatives of six charities and the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Funds are distributed at the local level by both the local EFSP boards from Ashland and Bayfield Counties.

We had a welcome surprise this summer from EFSP when we were informed there was a little extra money at the end of their grant cycle. The BRICK didn't have to submit another application or do anything extra. The additional funds from EFSP were automatically deposited into our bank account.

Thank you to all the folks at every level of the Emergency Food and Shelter Program for your ongoing partnership to help us reach the food insecure people in our community!



Many of you know our outgoing Food Shelf Manager as a no nonsense guy who gets the job done. You may have discovered his quirky and playful sense of humor

- a real gem. Usually, he's that steady presence ensuring that our Food Shelf Program runs smoothly.

You may not know of all the things that Dan's handled during his time with The BRICK. Last fall we started receiving dramatically more federal commodities food through the Trade Mitigation Purchase. Between January and July 2019 we'd already received over 100,000 pounds of food in federal commodities; in 2018 we received just under 96,000 for the entire year! On top of that, our other donated food has increased too. As of July we'd accepted over 153,000 pounds compared to last July's donations of about 140,000. Altogether that's a lot of extra food to handle. What a great problem to have! Dan has really tackled this problem well. He's worked with our pantries in Cable, Cornucopia, Mellen, and our home site in Ashland to get all that extra food onto the tables of our pantry shoppers. For many months our consumers have received bonus portions of milk, chicken, and pork. Dan's also worked with our suppliers to ensure that deliveries are timed to coincide with when our coolers and freezers aren't quite so full.

Dan has used his technical expertise to streamline our inventory tracking. He's converted a gigantic spreadsheet into something still large, but a little more manageable. He also shared his handyman skills to install our temporary air conditioners, which keeps the food in the warehouse at acceptable levels.

In his role he's worked with numerous volunteers. He's seen what works, and what could be better. He's helped develop clearer guidelines, processes and procedures for working with our volunteers. With Dan's input we've been able to do a better job coaching our volunteers to perform at their best.

These are just a few contributions that Dan has made in one short year. We're thankful for his service with The BRICK and wish him well. Please take the time to thank him personally for all he's done.

Julie always took pride in paying her bills on time. She thought of herself as a responsible person. When she received the call from Milwaukee, with the news her dad had been in a serious accident,

she dropped everything and headed down as quickly as possible. He was in the ICU for over a month, and she was all the family he had. Julie knew it was her responsibility to be there to talk to the doctors and be there to help her dad any way she could. She also knew she had a job, bills, and other responsibilities to attend to back home. The travel back and forth was expensive with gas, food, and lodging. She had a great boss that tried to be understanding to her situation. As her dad healed, Julie continued to try to meet all her obligations, but the bills started to pile up.

Julie visited The BRICK to find some financial assistance. When she sat down with me, she shared her story and couldn't keep her tears in any longer. She had never been in the position to need financial help before; she had always been the one to help others. Julie was exhausted and overwhelmed. We looked at the delinquent bills and developed a plan. We talked to the vendors together and made realistic pay arrangements where we could. The BRICK helped with small payments to some of the vendors that needed a payment up front to start the pay arrangement. We reached out to other organizations for additional assistance. When Julie started to leave, she told me she was so glad The BRICK was here not only for herself, but also for other people like her. "It's good to know there is somewhere people can go for help when the unexpected happens."

Cheryl Tveit is a powerhouse of inspiration for her fellow volunteers here at The BRICK's Ashland location! After a long hiatus from volunteering with the Good Shepherd crew during The BRICK's early days, Cheryl returned to volunteer at The BRICK about three years ago after retiring from the local Department of Corrections office. Currently, Cheryl volunteers several days a week at The BRICK providing support in the food shelf, helping with truck deliveries and pick-ups, occasionally filling in at the front desk, and helping with data entry. Most recently, Cheryl has taken on shadowing our Food Shelf Manager to move forward on our goal to develop succession planning for each staff position.

When Cheryl is not helping us out at The BRICK, she helps with BINGO at Court Manor and makes quilts with her church group for the Lutheran World Relief. Last year, the group made 250 quilts between September through May! On the third Wednesday of each month, Cheryl helps Good Shepherd's FLOCK serve a meal for children and their parents before classes begin. Cheryl can also be seen powerwalking her way through town each morning as she walks her five-mile loop. She also enjoys baking and reading murder mysteries (must be funny, never true crime).

Before retirement, Cheryl worked for the State of Wisconsin for 37 years. First, at the Department of Transportation in Madison for 14 years, then at the Department of Corrections in Ashland for 23 years. Her husband Keith worked as the Fire Chief in both Madison and Ashland for many years, then also worked at Wisconsin Emergency Management. Both retired in 2015. They have two sons, Kevin and Corey. Kevin also volunteers each day at The BRICK. Corey lives in Illinois with his wife, dog, and cat.
