

This semester I had the opportunity to intern at The BRICK Ministries through Northland College's Applied Learning Program. It is my last semester at Northland and I will be receiving a BA in sustainable community development. Throughout my college career I have developed a passion for addressing food security and access issues in small, rural communities. The BRICK Ministries is actively dedicated to addressing food insecurity and poverty in our community. This semester I was able to be a part of its mission "to live in Christ's message to compassionately love and respect those in need."

Through my internship at The BRICK I was able to assist customers through the pantry, which involved helping them choose their items based on household size. This sparked conversations about the enjoyment of food, a connection we all share. I developed a spreadsheet of Ashland and Bayfield Counties local farmers to increase partnerships with our beloved regional growers and further increase the amount of fresh, local produce in the program. In addition, I collaborated with the committed volunteers in stocking and sorting pantry items. I visited Erickson Orchard & Country Store to glean apples, which were then offered to community members through the program. I was also able to visit a few of our other pantry outlets to transport extra turkeys and turkey breasts. Lastly, I was able to attend a board meeting and learn about the various different board member roles and future projects. This experience has taught me a lot about the important function that food pantries have in any community, but especially ours.

Outlet Buzz

State of WI and Northwest Wisconsin Community Services Agency Support The BRICK

Beginning in the fall of 2018 The BRICK started receiving dramatically more federal commodities food through the Trade Mitigation Program (TMP), a "bonus" federal commodities initiative. Between January and July 2019 its Food Shelf Program had already received over 100,000 pounds of food in federal commodities – more than the entire previous year! On

top of that, other donated food has increased too. As of July The BRICK accepted over 153,000 pounds compared to last July's donations of about 140,000. Altogether that's a lot of extra food to handle.

But there was an issue. The BRICK was struggling for enough freezer and cooler space. But this was solved thanks to the Wisconsin — Department of Health Services (DHS) and Northwest Wisconsin Community Services Agency (NWCSA)! Now The BRICK has new merchandiser coolers at the Cable Area Food Shelf, Helping Hands Food Shelf — Mellen, and South Shore

Food Shelf – Cornucopia. The pantries in Cornucopia and Ashland also have new merchandizer freezers; and the home site in Ashland also has a new walk-in freezer – just in time for Thanksgiving turkeys! As if that weren't enough, The BRICK's van now has four new tires to be used when it's time to switch out the snow tires in the spring.

Anna and Zach had always handled their finances well, but when their son, Nicholas, developed a rare medical condition, the bills started to mount. Because of Nicholas's special needs, Anna decided to leave her job to care for him at home. Zach had to miss work to be with his family when Nicholas had multiple surgeries. The specialists for Nicholas are in cities far away from their home so travel expenses can be high. All of these challenges have contributed to their current financial situation.

When Anna and Zach visited The BRICK, we looked at all their bills. We talked to the vendors together to set up realistic payment arrangements. We prioritized the expenses and looked for ways to cut and save. I referred them to different programs in our community that could help them with travel costs and other expenses. We also looked at organizations that could support them emotionally through these challenges.

The BRICK's Benevolence Program provides families with a safe place to share their challenges and then partners with them to create a plan that works for each individual family. Thanks to our many partners' support, we are able to help folks like Anna and Zach every day!


From the Board Room

Grants Support Our Mission to Serve!

The BRICK Ministries is fortunate to have partners from several grant making organizations throughout the year. We're thrilled to welcome a new partner to our work and to say thank you to a long-time backer.

This fall our Benevolence Program received a generous matching grant of \$10,000 from Associated Bank!
