I'm writing this note on the last day possible before publication – Leap Day! I might have been procrastinating, but by putting off writing I unwittingly had the chance to be inspired. This morning I attended the funeral of a former volunteer, Russell Lein, who served at our South Shore Food Shelf. Anyone who knew Russ or his sister Sue Anderson, our former board member, would understand why they framed his service as a time of joy, rather than sorrow. Although Russ had more than his fair share of hardships, he wanted to focus on the good things in life. He was an intellect, a handyman, and a person of deep faith - an example even in his passing.

One of the scripture readings at Russ's service was Matthew 11:28. Jesus is speaking to the people and says "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. . . ." As the pastor spoke, my thoughts wandered to this message, and I made the connection between these words of comfort and The BRICK's mission and vision to serve through Christ's love. We know that plenty of our consumers are carrying a heavy burden, yet we offer them a place to rest.



Russ passed away just before the beginning of Lent and I can't help make the comparison between Russ's final days and beyond to the period of Lent and on into Easter. Both transitions include a time of dormancy that results in

great beauty. A common comparison from the natural world is that of the caterpillar-to-butterfly, and the butterfly symbolizes the renewal and regeneration we experience through Christ's deep love for us.

My hope is that The BRICK can also be a place where each one of us can rest while we are remade by Grace.

Hello from inside the Food Shelf!

It's amazing to see how much support is given through donations as the previous year has wrapped up. In 2019, a total of 550,406 pounds of food and personal care items were distributed throughout Ashland and Bayfield Counties through our four locations - Ashland, Cable, Cornucopia, and Mellen. Through various organizations, individuals, Walmart, Super One, Kwik Trip, Second Harvest Northern Lakes Food Bank, and other businesses, we received a total of 260,474 pounds of food that was donated. It's amazing to see communities come together to fight hunger. All of the distribution of food and items could not be done without our amazing crew of volunteers and the generous support and prayers from individuals and organizations.

What's new at the Cable Area Food Shelf this year? The BRICK's new Food Shelf Manager, Emma, for one thing! We're very happy to have her working with us, developing partnerships to find great nutritious food for our participants.

We also love our new commercial refrigerator which allows us space to store so much more fresh dairy and produce.



Our local store, Rondeau's Shopping Center, is now putting bags together for shoppers to purchase food shelf donations, always including the items we need most. Bags are emptied into our food shelf collection bins after purchase and then recycled for use again. This has increased food donations and helped with variety for our shoppers. We also have lots of financial donors who realize how much further their money goes when The BRICK purchases for us through Second Harvest.

Thankfully some things haven't changed, like our faithful coordinators at each of the four Cable churches. They not only take their turn providing and coordinating volunteers

from their churches to staff our monthly food shelf, help with food collection and stocking, but also provide great ideas to help us do things better and serve our participants with a welcoming presence.

Before Julia left she thanked me with tears in her eyes, telling me she had never been treated with such respect and kindness. Everyone had always just told her what she needed to do and never asked her what she wanted. This is the kind of difference The BRICK can make for our consumers. We recognize that we may be the only place where someone feels heard and validated — that they're okay just as they are.

Thank you to all our partners who help us work with folks in all kinds of circumstances every day!



Al Reedy

In my initial impression of Al, I was struck by his gentle, down-to-earth demeanor. But don't be fooled—Al has led one full and exciting life. Born and raised in the metropolitan area of Minneapolis, Al was the oldest of nine kids. As an adult, he joined the Air Force until he retired in 1981 as the Station Chief of the weather station at McCord Air Base in Washington State. Al also served in combat during the Vietnam War for one year, providing support to an orphanage. His military career stationed him all over the US and abroad in Germany. Upon retiring from the Force, Al went into government service, including a brief position with the Weather Bureau before transitioning to work with the Postal Service until he retired as a Post Master in 1998. Al studied Business Management at the University of Maryland and received an MBA in Public Management from an institute in

Washington State. He married Lorayne in 1965, and has two daughters currently living in Washington and Utah.

Upon Al's retirement, Al and Lorayne decided to move back to her home state in Wisconsin. Lorayne's family owned some property in Cornucopia, where they began building their home in 2006. Along with fellow residents such as Kermit and Judith DelMain, Al helped start up the South Shore Food Shelf, and has been a dedicated volunteer ever since! Al volunteers at the pantry every first and third Thursday of the month. He helps keep the pantry stocked and assists participants as needed. Al also picks up items from Coco's Bakery for the pantry each week, and helps track the pantry's inventory.

In addition to his involvement with The BRICK's South Shore Food Shelf, Al is the President of Immanuel Lutheran's Church Council, and participates with three different choirs, including Park &

Songs ("Parkinson's") that performs for local area nursing homes, and a Christmas and Easter Cantata that performs at various congregations in Iron River. Al has also served as a Town Supervisor for the Town of Bell. He enjoys maple syruping, and looks forward to the upcoming tapping season. He also loves golfing and plays a minimum of three times a week during the summer months.
