The Cable Area Food Shelf is celebrating its tenth anniversary this month! Ten years ago, the pastor of the Cable United Church of Christ, Deb Pyne, decided Cable needed a food pantry. She worked with the pastors of the four churches in Cable to come together and start one. After visiting several area food shelves, including The BRICK, we were offered a chance to become the second outlying site for The BRICK's Food Shelf Program, Mellen being the first. Later the South Shore site was added to complete coverage for all of Ashland and Bayfield Counties.

All four congregations - Cable United Church of Christ, Living Hope Community Church, St. Ann Catholic Church, and Trinity Lutheran Chapel – pulling together make our pantry a success. They each bring in parishioners to staff the food shelf on their assigned month and are ambassadors for our pantry. Together they add to the strength of our



network and the quality of our services. Though we have had occasional changes in the volunteers who help by coordinating other volunteers from their churches and taking their turns coordinating the food shelf, all four churches remain involved and very supportive of the mission and vision of The BRICK to provide help to those in need. We look forward to many more years of service as part of The BRICK.

#### **Reflections from an Out-going Board Member**

Growing up in northern Wisconsin, natural water has always been a part of my life— Lake Superior, Chequamegon Bay, Brule River, Morgan Falls, Lake Owen... (I could go on and on). Each body of water is a living entity, filled with beauty and power, dangerous currents and calm serenity. The roar of rushing rapids gives way to smooth still waters. Each human journey can be compared to traveling the many waters of life. Sometimes the waters are peaceful, feeding our souls with peace and other times we are plummeted by treacherous waves, rocks and rip currents, often appearing without warning.

It is during these turbulent times of life that The BRICK is present—to fulfill its mission—to keep individuals and families afloat until they reach the calm. Our lives are ever-changing and there are times that we need help to keep our vessel afloat, to keep us from capsizing, to save us from drowning until we can navigate on our own.

This is what The BRICK does. This is what I have learned during my six years of serving on the Board. The BRICK is an amazing faith-based organization dedicated to keeping people afloat. The BRICK manages an annual budget of \$980,800, more than half of which is the value of donated food. These funds come solely from grants and donations. The more money that is contributed to The BRICK, the more people can be helped. By the middle of each month, the money for financial aid other than food is used up. The BRICK staff tell me that the hardest part of their jobs is to tell a patron that we can't help them this month. Referrals are made to other agencies but resources are scarce all over.

In 2020, the BRICK assisted 6,068 families and 14,051 individuals with food and 430 families and 950 individuals with financial aid to stay healthy such as housing, heating, and transportation.

The most incredible resource at The BRICK is its staff followed closely by the volunteers. Liz, Amaris, Cheyenne and Sam comprise three full time and one parttime positions. They keep the organization going with passion, dedication, and very hard work. They keep our community afloat. I have worked in various positions and organization and they truly are the hardest working people that I have encountered.

It is with heartfelt thanks to the staff, volunteers, and the very dedicated, creative Board members that I leave my Board position. I can honestly say that The BRICK is a most valuable and viable organization to contribute to monetarily or with time and talent.

I have faith that The BRICK, with the help and generosity of the surrounding communities, will continue to support those caught in the rough waters until they reach their destination on the calm side of the shore.

Although we are grateful to be able to distribute fresh produce year-round thanks to our partnerships with Feeding America and Second Harvest, some surveys suggest that fresh produce is the second-most requested items by consumers and 60% receive half or more of their monthly produce from food shelves. Please keep us in your plans when planting this season, or consider donating your harvest over-abundance. We are also able to organize volunteers to glean the leftovers.

Also, as our consumer participation numbers are down, we HAVE FOOD! 
