From the Director—

One of my favorite devotionals – Living Compass – has an especially relevant theme for Lent. This year's series is entitled Practicing Compassion with All Your Heart, Soul, Strength, and Mind. The Ash Wednesday meditation "Wrestling with Compassion" set the stage for the rest of the season. Jennifer Baskerville-Burrows writes that ". . . many of us may be teetering on the edge of compassion fatigue. . . . But Lent is a chance to wrestle with compassion once more." Her thoughts bring me back to The BRICK. We're all about compassion - it's in our mission statement! The BRICK exists "to live Christ's message to compassionately love and respect those in need." This isn't easy work. Pope Francis suggests that we "fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others." Compassion is more than seeing others through a lens of kindness and empathy. It also means taking our ego out of the picture. That doesn't mean ignoring our own very real needs. Too often we deny our own brokenness and tell ourselves to tough it out. Compassion for others and ourselves doesn't come naturally. Baskerville-Burrows recognizes that "it takes practice to be gentle and kind to oneself and others we meet each day." We can only get so far on our own. She wraps up with a reflection that I pass on to you: "May you be blessed by this Lenten journey with our compassionate and loving God."

One goal of The BRICK's new strategic plan is to reach more isolated consumers. There are many community members who qualify for our services, but don't tap into what The BRICK has to offer. That may be due to a lack of knowledge, too much pride, or mobility and transportation issues. In the coming months, our team will be identifying where the greatest need is. We'll also explore how we can deepen our partnerships with area

churches and agencies that already have connections to the folks we're trying to reach. We're excited about the possibilities that might spring from this initiative.

We've actually been working on this for many years. The BRICK's early leaders recognized that many who live in the

outlying parts of Ashland and Bayfield Counties are not able to travel the distance to our home office in Ashland. It's a hardship, and the trip isn't worth the gas. As a result, in our first four years, The BRICK opened three more pantries, so folks didn't have to make the long drive.



The Helping Hands Food Shelf in Mellen celebrated 12 years of service in February. Their volunteer team and pantry shoppers celebrated the milestone with treats and fanfare. A few key people have been involved since they opened their doors in 2011. Most notable is Outlet Site Manager Bill Polencheck. He not only manages operations, but also promotes the pantry throughout the community. He goes

the extra mile to make connections with the local churches and the Mellen School District. Happy Anniversary!

The BRICK's other two outlying pantries will mark their anniversaries later in

the year. The Cable Area Food Shelf will celebrate 12 years in May and the South Shore Food Shelf in Cornucopia will ring in 13 years of operation in July.

Important FoodShare Update: During the pandemic, nationwide all households using SNAP benefits (known as FoodShare in Wisconsin) had been receiving the maximum benefit plus an additional Covid relief amount. The State of Wisconsin announced a return to pre-pandemic FoodShare benefits (a/k/a food stamps, EBT, etc.) beginning March 1st, 2023. It has happened several times since I started this position last October. Consumers come to my office seeking financial assistance, and feel guilty or embarrassed about asking for help.




